Comprehension

Pupils should be taught to:

develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read, vocabulary and understanding by:

Listening to and discussing a wide range of poems, stories and non-fiction at a level beyond that at which they can read independently.

Being encouraged to link what they read or hear read to their own experiences.

Becoming very familiar with key stories, fairy stories and traditional tales, retelling them and considering their particular characteristics.

Recognising and joining in with predictable phrases.

Learning to appreciate rhymes and poems, and to recite some by heart.

Read most words quickly and accurately, without overt sounding and blending, when they have been frequently encountered

Read aloud books closely matched to their improving phonic knowledge, sounding out unfamiliar words accurately, automatically and without undue hesitation.

Re-read these books to build up their fluency and confidence in word reading.

Comprehension

Pupils should be taught to:

develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read, vocabulary and understanding by:

Listening to, discussing and expressing views about a wide range of poetry (including contemporary and classic), stories and nonfiction at a level beyond that at which they can read independently.

Discussing the sequence of events in books and how items of information are related.

Becoming increasingly familiar with and retelling

Using dictionaries to check the meaning of words that they have read.

Increasing their familiarity with a wide range of books, including fairy stories, myths and legends, and retelling some of these orally.

Identifying themes and conventions in a wide range of books.

Preparing poems and play scripts to read aloud and to perform, showing understanding through intonation, tone, volume and action.

Discussing words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination.

Recognising some different forms of poetry [for example, free verse, narrative poetry]

Understand what they read, in books they can read independently, by:

Checking that the text makes sense to them, discussing their understanding and explaining the meaning of words in context
